New Business: K. Moser, A. Albert, and R. Kobel were to check, Barratt to find out if the reloading machine was being used for reloading for the membership.

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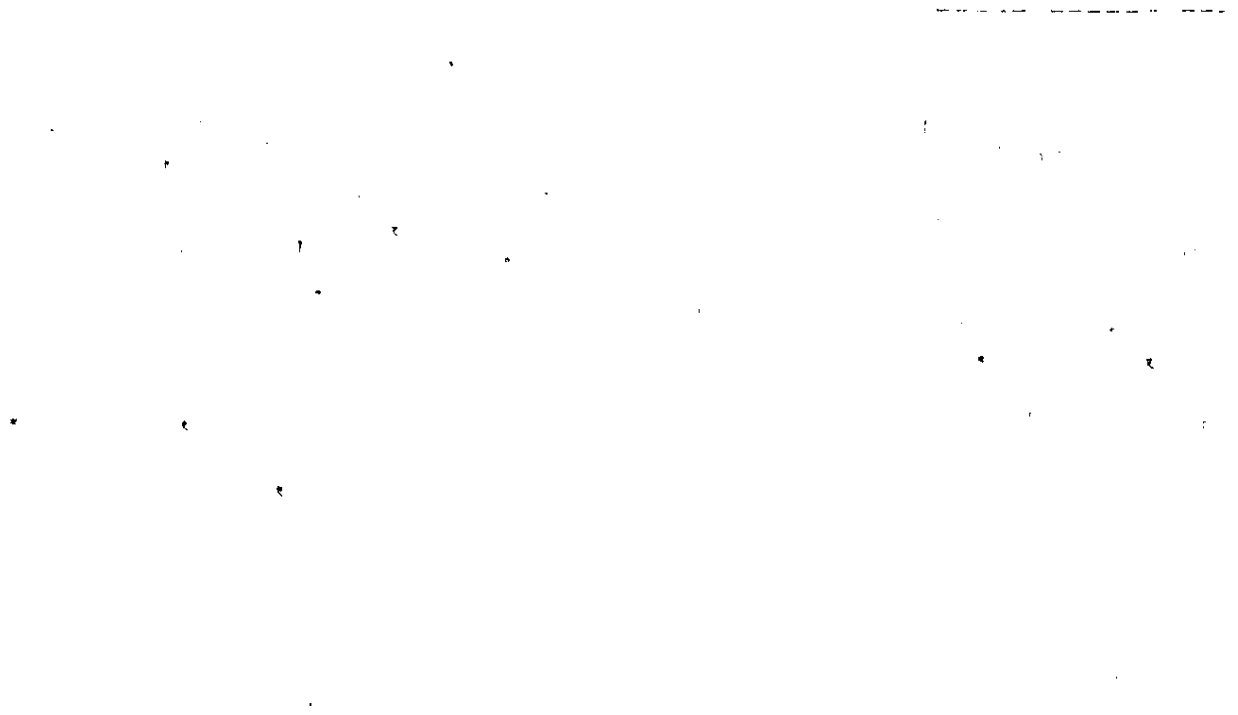

A member reported that there was much unfinished work at the camp. A work program is needed shortly.

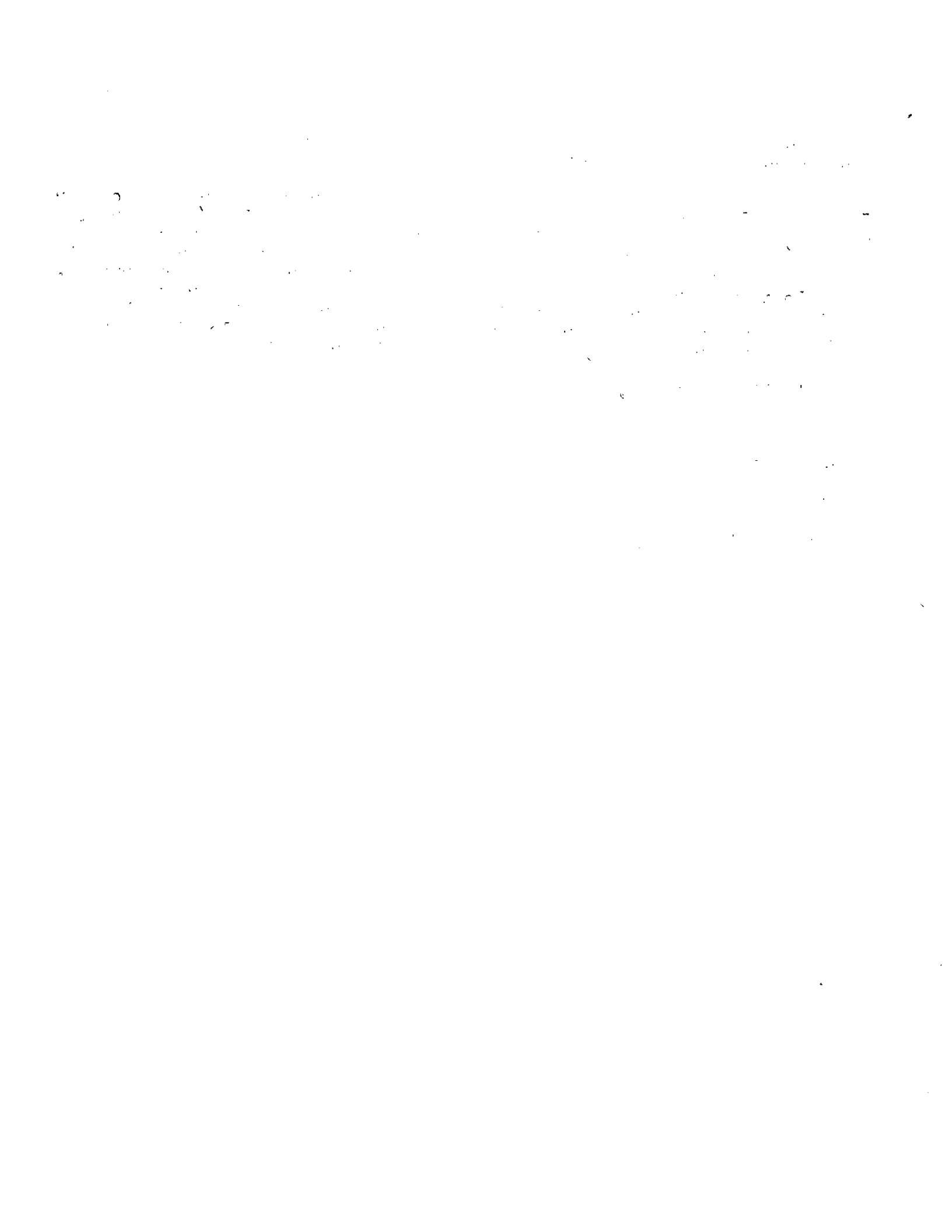
