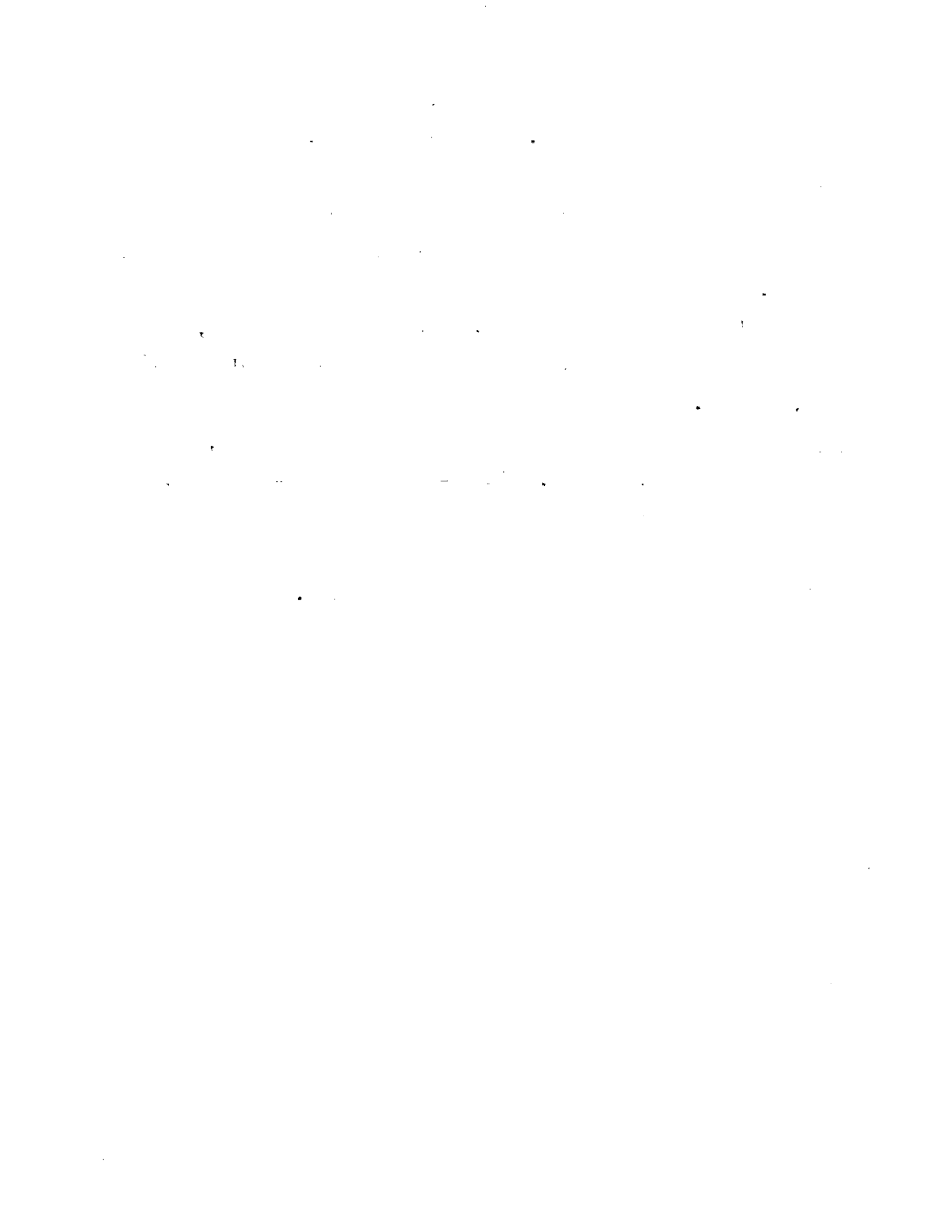
E.C.F.S.C. - No report
